Prevent holiday fires:


- Planning a huge light display? Overloading outlets is a risk not to take.

MAIL THEFT

As a neighborhood watch member you have agreed to work together with your neighbors and police to prevent crime. Mail theft occurs all year long, but there may be even more risk during the holiday shopping season. Here are some examples of what you can do to prevent mail theft on your block:

- Ask a trusted neighbor to watch for and pick up your package.
- Only the mail carrier (putting items in) or the homeowner (taking mail out) should be in the mailbox. If someone else is tampering with your or your neighbor's mailbox, call 911 to report this.
- Use your neighborhood contact list to reach neighbors if you notice a crime risk. (Garage is left open late at night)
- If you see suspicious activity that could be a burglary or package theft, call 911 to report it to police.
- Keep in touch with neighbors year-round in whatever means your group has set up.
- Have a Neighborhood Watch meeting at least twice a year to catch up with neighbors and get updated crime information from the police department.

Many homes have sold in New Hope in recent months. Make sure to welcome new residents to your neighborhood watch group and update your contact list so all can participate!

If your home is burglarized, or suffers a natural disaster, having a detailed inventory can help identify stolen items and make insurance claims easier to file.

Make sure things like TVs, power tools, stereo equipment, cameras, jewelry, silver, computers, and home office equipment are on the list.

Data Breach What Can You Do?

It seems we hear daily about a new data breach that may impact our risk of becoming a victim of identity theft. With the recent breach to Equifax, and all the others, it is a safe bet that your sensitive personal and financial information was compromised and now it is just a matter of how and when that information may be used by someone. So what can you do right now? Most of the information below is compiled from the FTC Consumer Information Blog dated September 8, 2017, and updated on October 5, 2017. It can be found in it's entirety at: https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/blog/2017/09/equifax-data-breach-what-do

- First, make the assumption that someone has your information and plans to use it to steal from you or someone else
- Second take action.
- ◊ DO: Change your account passwords, and don't use the same password for many accounts.
- ◊ DO: Monitor your existing credit and bank accounts closely for any fraud.
- OON'T: give out your social security #, credit card #, or bank account information to anyone who contacts you via phone, email, text, or other means.
- DON'T: leave your purse or wallet sitting unattended.
- DON'T: carry your social security card or other cards you don't need.
- ◊ DO: store financial records securely and shred them when you no longer need them.
- ODN'T: post your date of birth, mothers maiden name, first pets name or other security question information on Facebook, or other social media sites.
- DO: File your taxes early to prevent someone else from filing for a tax refund using your SSN.
- OD: Respond immediately to letters from the IRS, but beware of phone scams who pretend to be the IRS collecting past due tax.
- OO: Use a <u>secure computer</u> and <u>encrypted network connections</u> when you visit the Equifax website, <u>www.equifaxsecurity2017.com</u> to verify whether your information was affected by the breach. Click here for the <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u>.

* Even if your information was not compromised, U.S. consumers can get a year of free credit monitoring and other services. The deadline to enroll has been extended to January 31, 2018.

- OD: Check your credit reports on <u>annualcreditreport.com</u>. This can be done online (be prepared with your personal and financial information to verify your identity), by phone, or by mail. Instructions for each are available on the site
- If you find accounts that you don't recognize: visit <u>IdentityTheft.gov</u> for information on what to do, or call New Hope Police Community Services at 763-531-5140 to request a hard copy of "Identity Theft, A Recovery Plan".

Credit Freeze or Fraud Alert?

- A <u>Credit Freeze</u> on your accounts locks down your credit and will make it harder for someone to open a new account in your name. (It does not keep a crook from making charges to your existing accounts) There is a fee for the credit freeze service and you must contact each of the three credit reporting companies to request it.
- A <u>Fraud Alert</u> on your accounts will warn creditors that you may be an identity theft victim and they should take extra steps to verify anyone seeking credit in your name is really you. The Fraud Alert is free. The length of the fraud alert can vary from 90 days to seven years depending on your circumstance.
